Philip D. Reynolds, PhD.

Philip D. Reynolds, PhD, serves as Associate Dean of Student Services for the Alabama College of Osteopathic Medicine (ACOM). Dr. Reynolds received his Ph.D. in Pharmacology from the University of South Alabama College of Medicine in 1998. He continued his research in a postdoctoral training program at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. He received a BS degree in Biology from Troy University. He returned to Troy University in 2003 to serve as an Assistant Professor in the Department of Biological and Environmental Sciences and the Director of the Health Professions Advising Office. His teaching experience spans subject areas of pharmacology, anatomy, physiology, histology, biochemistry, and public health.

In June, 2011, Dr. Reynolds joined the administration team for the Alabama College of Osteopathic Medicine as the Associate Dean and Associate Professor of Pharmacology. Dr. Reynolds led the Self-Study efforts of ACOM resulting in full accreditation status granted to ACOM by the Commission on Osteopathic College Accreditation (COCA) in 2017. Jaishree Patel, Pharm. D.

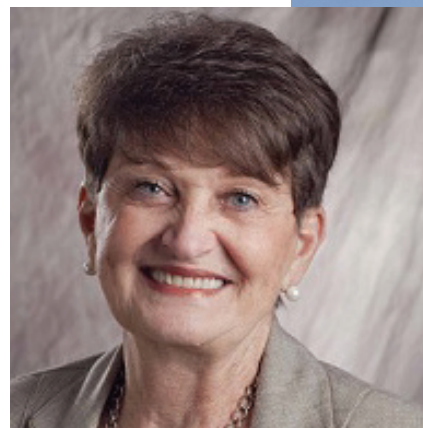

Medical Careers Exposure and Emergency Preparedness Initiative (MedCEEP)

MedCEEP is a non-profit organization, founded by Dr. Abdullah Pratt, with the mission to address the problems of poor healthcare, low health literacy, violence, lack of access to quality healthcare providers, and systemic injustices that have plagued our underserved communities for generations. We focus on empowering Underrepresented minority youth to become trained in recognizing and responding to the most prevalent life-threatening emergency scenarios while being exposed to health-related careers, in hopes of increasing representation in the field of medicine. We aim to sustainably combat pervasive healthcare disparities that more commonly impact the underserved communities we work with..



Dr. Abdullah Pratt

Dr. Abdullah Hasan Pratt, is an Assistant Professor and Emergency Medicine Physician at the University of Chicago Medical Center. Known as “Dee”; Dr. Pratt’s goal has always been to have a career advocating for underserved communities and addressing systemic healthcare disparities. A pivotal point in Dr. Pratt’s career came in the year between his third and fourth years of medical school, where he directed his actions toward advocating for a new Level One Trauma Center for Chicago’s Southside through University of Chicago Medical Center. Though 2021 will mark his 11th year on the campus of The University of Chicago, it has been the 31 years of experiences over his lifetime as a resident of Chicago’s Southside that have shaped and guided his career to this point. He attributes this commitment to his childhood experiences witnessing the poor health conditions, premature deaths, and day to day struggles from a lack of access to proper healthcare by the people he cared about. As an Emergency Medicine physician, he continues to vigorously work to improve health literacy and emergency preparedness through teaching South-Side residents and youth how to properly respond to cardiac arrests, penetrating traumas (gunshot victims), and strokes prior to the arrival of medical assistance while also addressing the effect being exposed to gun violence has on their emotional well-being.

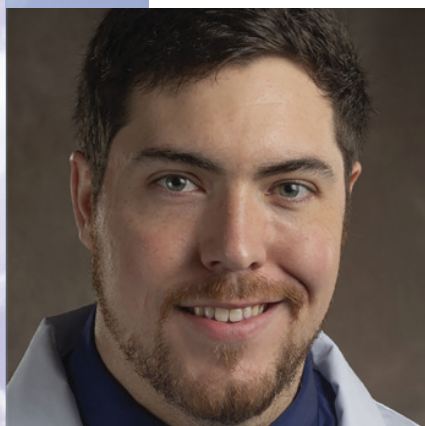

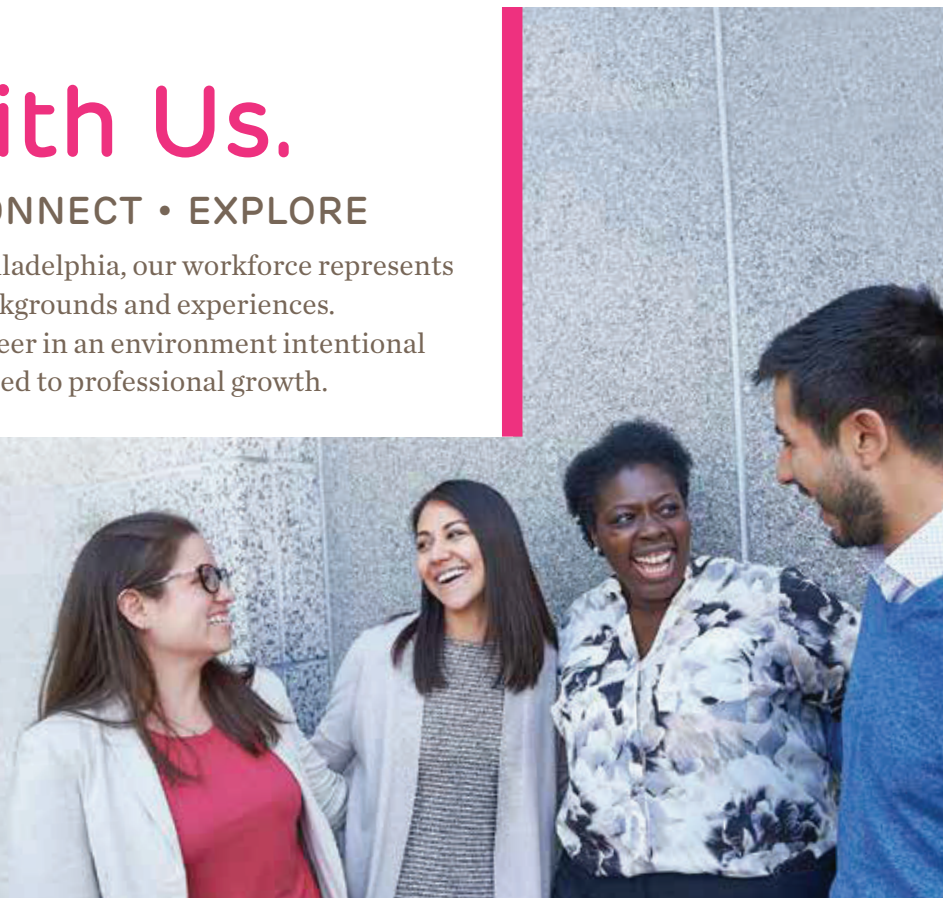

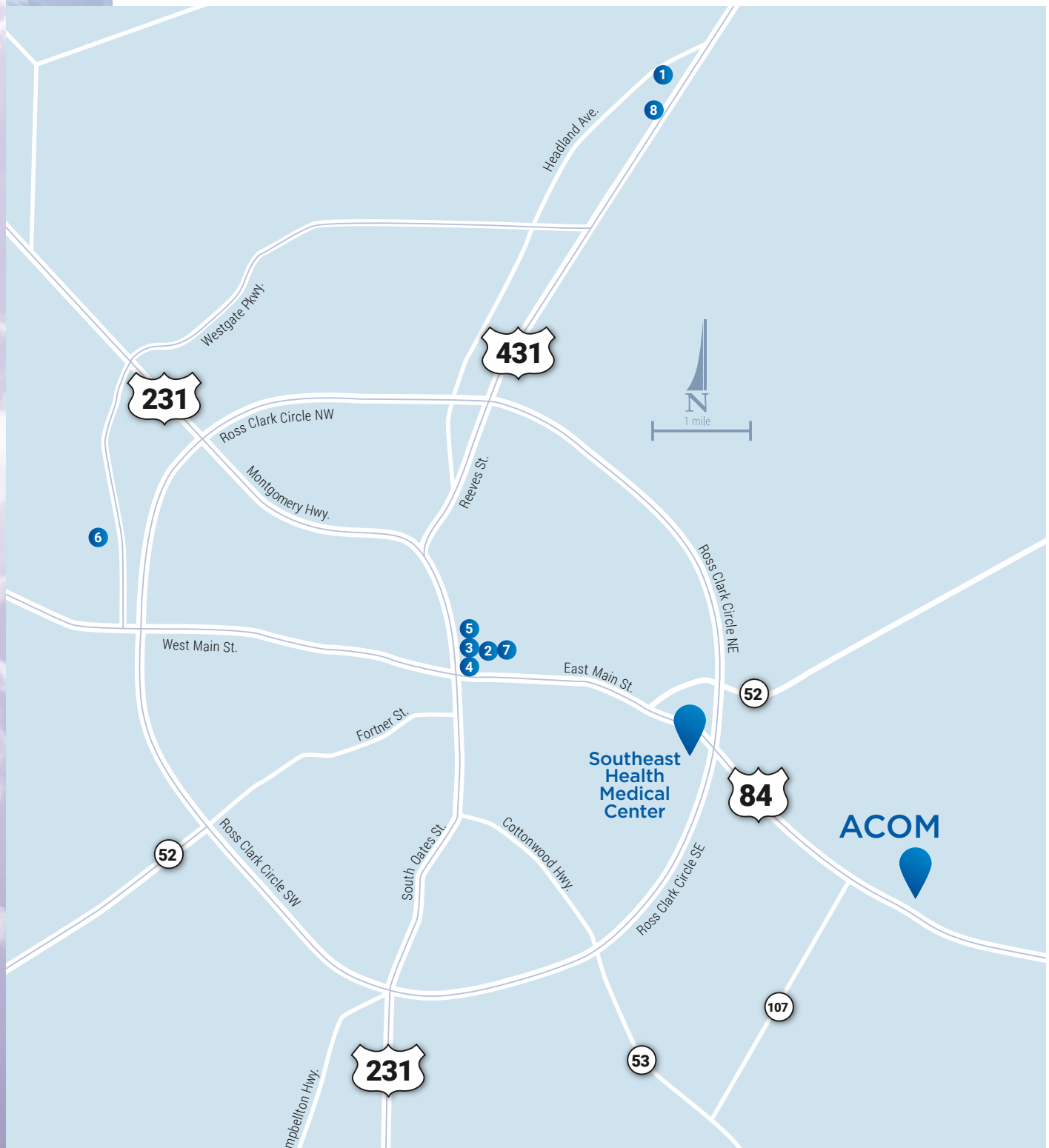

1 DOTHAN AREA BOTANICAL GARDENS

This 50-acre preserve is home to a variety of Southern plants and flowers among its scenic walking trails, open spaces, and carefully curated gardens. .

2 DOTHAN CIVIC CENTER

The Dothan Civic Center opened in 1975 with an opening-night concert by hometown singer and 1960s pop sensation Bobby Goldsboro.

3 DOTHAN OPERA HOUSE

A hundred years ago, Dothan mayor Buck Baker had the inspiration to construct a grand opera house. It is now on the National Register of Historic Buildings.

4 DOWNTOWN MURALS

Nearly two dozen huge outdoor murals grace the exterior walls of buildings in downtown Dothan. The project began as a downtown beautification project and today Dothan is known across the southeast for its historically-themed outdoor art gallery.

5 G.W. CARVER INTERPRETIVE MUSEUM

Located in downtown Dothan, the G.W. Carver Interpretive Museum is focused on educating individuals of all ages, races and creeds on the rich historical contributions of African-Americans.

6 WESTGATE PARK

Dothan's largest park started out as the city's airfield back in the mid 20th century. Located on Dothan's west side, this massive park has over a dozen athletic fields, a 3.2-mile walking/bike trail, a BMX bike track, a world-class tennis center and a water park.

7 WIREGRASS MUSEUM OF ART

The Wiregrass Museum of Art hosts artwork of artists from around the city, state and country across seven galleries, three floors and 12,000 square feet. The museum is an active force in the community with its many art education programs and special events.

8 LANDMARK PARK

This 135-acre park four miles north of Dothan preserves Alabama's agricultural heritage through exhibits, restored turn-of-the-(last)-century buildings and a functioning farmstead.





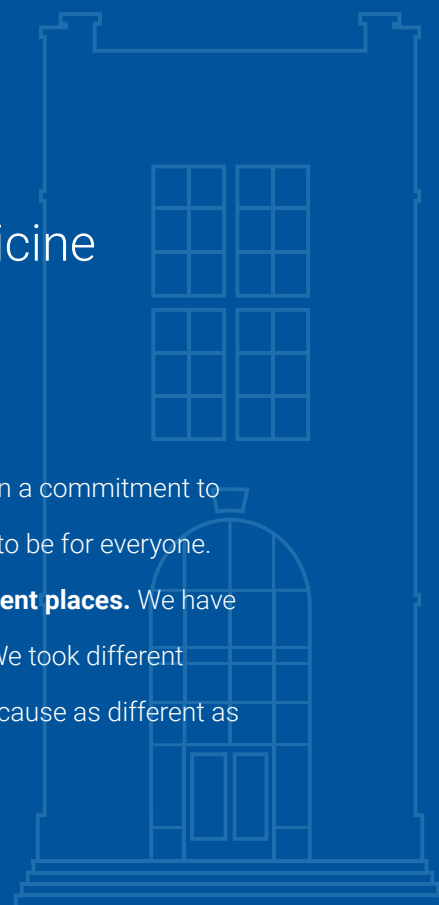
